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
Message from the CEO

ello everyone! I was very honoured to spend another year with the Yukon Arts Centre as their Indigenous Advisor. 2023 was a year of planning and looking towards launching the Honouring our Future exhibit in London, England, which opened at Canada House in June 2024.

As the curator and wearing the hat of Indigenous advisor, it was easy to recognize and incorporate the inclusion of an elder and youth to accompany us for the launch. Having the guidance of an elder and valuing and honouring our youth is such an important part of cultural practice.

I also want to again, take this opportunity to recognize the huge request we have made on families on having them part with pieces of their treasured regalia. Many of these pieces have taken a year or more to make, and their value is immeasurable as input into some of the work was done by multi-generations of the family. I also want to acknowledge the expertise of the Yukon Arts Centre staff in building special crates for the regalia to travel in. Each piece was handled and packed with the upmost respect and care, cradled in their own unique travelling wardrobe for their long journey.

In February, the YAC staff and I had the pleasure of spending the day with Jenny and Dennis Shorty, who led a workshop where we all got to make beautiful pieces of copper jewellery. I was able to share a pot of moose stew for lunch, which I think filled everyone up on that winter day! It was a great day to spend together, and learn more about Dennis's Kaska traditions and community.



presenting high quality, live performances for thousands of Yukoners, including students in 10 Yukon communities and many evening performances in conjunction with our valued partners KIAC, DCMF, JAM, Wonderhorse, Nakai Theatre,

and Adaka. I hope these performances not only entertained, but also brought joy, touched people deeply somehow, and were provocative reflections of ourselves, our community and the world we live in.

Whitehorse audiences enjoyed returning favorites like Jill Barber, Julie Nesrallah, Frazey Ford, Whitehorse, The Good Lovelies, Shaun Majumder and Hannah Georgas. They turned out in full costume for Charles Ross' One Man Star Wars and danced the night away to Yukon Blonde and Moontricks.

We experimented with these last two performances, leaving theatre doors open and the bar accessible for the whole evening, encouraging audience members to move freely from the dance floor and the theatre as they wished. This created a festival-like atmosphere, and we heard many positive comments from patrons who expressed great pleasure at being able to dance and experience our venue in a completely different way. And it was gratifying to see so many new faces in our building. This was also the case when we presented Kid Koala and Lealani X who brought out many fans of this well-respected DJ who also introduced us to this new performer.

We also brought bands who are very well known but who had never performed in the Yukon before -Crash Test Dummies, Broken Social Scene and the The Barra MacNeils played to sold out audiences. Many also enjoyed Great Lake Swimmers and the beautiful sounds of Weather Station.

Families were entertained at many events this past year, including at the Midnight Sun Moppets Children's Festival which saw hundreds attend many events throughout the day including performances by Ginalina and Gustavo the Impossibilist.

Later in the year, Bobs N Lolo also drew hundreds of young fans, who stood in line to get autographs after the show and were not disappointed as the artists made sure to meet them all

The Great Balonzo also made an appearance again, this time on our Main Stage after appearing last year in our children's festival.

Many families also came out to the Old Fire Hall for our Family Fam Jam – to participate in art and circus workshops, ending with a dance with Remy Rodden. Local youth also participated in a project with Vancouver-based The Chop Theatre, who are developing a new work with youth based on how and where kids play around the world. They worked with children in Hong Kong, Vancouver, Dublin and Whitehorse and we look forward to seeing the outcome of this work titled *Playing* Fields. Families were also thrilled by the German company CHAMALEON with their show Raven, featuring a mix of cirque, dance and theatre. Hundreds of Whitehorse students also got the opportunity to see local theatre company Open Pit's amazing and heartfelt production of Radio Silence.

Our Northwestel Hanging Sky Tour was very active this year and we were pleased to offer schools in over 10 communities circus workshops and a short performance by Flyin Bob. As well, we toured local musician Shannon O'Donovan to Old Crow: Willam Prince to Haines Junction with our partners Junction Arts and Music and Mo Kenny in Dawson in partnership with Queer Yukon. We supported folk group Kacy and Clayton's performance at the Dawson City Music Festival and The Weather Station with our long-term presenting partner Klondike Institute of Arts and Culture.

Finally, we offered a variety of workshops for young and old through the children's festival, workshops at the Old Fire Hall and provided time with Julie Nesrallah who gave a workshop with Yukon Theatre for Young People. Local comedians benefited from an evening with the formidable Ivan Dekker and Charlie Demers.

I am very proud of this year's offerings, and look forward to serving our audiences next year with more live performance events in schools and venues around the Yukon.

Community **Presenting Series**

The Community Presenting Series curates a balance of hospitable and progressive performances aiming to make the Yukon Arts Centre a community hub and an integral part of the life of all Yukoners.

To be more inclusive in our programming, YAC has partnered with other arts organizations, such as the Paradise Music Festival, to bring up more diverse performances that will attract more Yukoners to our space.

The communities continued to benefit from the Northwestel Hanging Sky Tour, which brings in Outside performers. With funding from Victoria Gold's Every Student Every Day program, children's performers were sent to schools throughout the Yukon to give workshops.








New Website, **New Look**

Five years in the digital world is a long time without a refresh. In the summer of 2023, YAC received funding from Lotteries Yukon to rebuild its website to give it a more modern and user-friendly design. Calgary's Strut Creative was contracted to build this new design, which was a three-month endeavour. The new site was launched back in March 2023.







The gallery exhibits of 2023 and 2024 highlight an impressive array of artistic talent and cultural narratives, providing audiences with a rich journey through various themes and mediums.

Suzanne Paleczny's The Forgetting, presented in the summer of 2023, poignantly explored memory loss through large-scale paintings inspired by her personal experiences with her parents' dementia. These works reflect the fragility of memory and the emotional impact of forgetting on individuals and families, creating a powerful and intimate narrative that deeply resonates with viewers.

Neil Graham's exhibition, The Nahanni, captured the beauty and mystery of the Nahanni River. Through his stunning paintings,

Graham highlighted the region's dramatic landscapes and the essence of river journeys, inviting audiences to appreciate the breathtaking scenery and its significance.

Also in the summer of 2023, we presented Honouring Our Future at the Teslin Tlingit Heritage Centre. This retrospective celebrates the history, creation, and design of First Nations high school graduation regalia, highlighting the cultural significance and artistry of each piece. The exhibit, which includes intricately beaded gowns, hand-sewn moccasins, and home-tanned vests, marked its last stop in the Yukon after traveling to Dawson City, Haines Junction, Carcross, Whitehorse, and Teslin over the past three and a half years.

Each piece in the exhibit tells a unique story of heritage, pride, and community, emphasizing the importance of cultural continuity. As we concluded its journey in the Yukon, we began preparing for the next stage of the tour, as we were honoured to be selected to present Honouring Our Future at Canada House in London, UK, offering an international audience the chance to engage with and appreciate the rich cultural heritage of Yukon First Nations.

The Yukon Prize 2023 exhibition, running from September 14 to November 18, celebrated the exceptional talents of Yukon artists,

featuring the finalists and winners of the prestigious Yukon Prize for Visual Arts. This exhibit promoted and recognized excellence in visual arts within the region, showcasing diverse and innovative works that captured the spirit and creativity of the Yukon, testifying to the thriving artistic community and the remarkable talent found within the territory. This year's winner, Kaylyn Baker, a beadwork and fashion artist from the Selkirk First Nation, used traditional techniques to tell often personal stories with her bold color and pattern choices that dazzled viewers.

Celebrating the 20th anniversary of the Yukon Artists @ Work (YAAW) cooperative, the gallery was filled with works from over 75 artists. Curated by Janet Patterson and Nicole Bauberger, this show highlighted the collaborative spirit and contributions of these artists to the Yukon arts community, showcasing a wide range of styles and mediums that reflect the diverse talents and creative expressions shaping the local art scene over the past two decades.

The collective La Bête à cinq têtes, composed of four Yukon Francophone artists (Marie-Hélène Comeau, Cécile Girard, Virginie Hamel, and Françoise La Roche), presented works inspired by the legend of La Chasse-galerie. This tale of a flying canoe navigating between worlds was brought to life through art that explored Northern identity, themes of isolation, light,

and darkness, and the mystical and cultural significance of the legend.

Shii'itsüh | Crying in the Heart is a collection of three installations by Teresa Vander Meer-Chassé, running from February 29 to May 24, 2024. Created during her Master of Fine Arts studies at Concordia University under the guidance of her grandmother, White River First Nation/Upper Tanana Elder Marilyn John, these works delve into themes of grief, loss, and remembrance, using thoughtful and poignant materials to convey deep emotional narratives.

Inland Tlingit artist Violet Gatensby's solo exhibition, Where the Waters Narrow, held alongside Vander Meer-Chassé's works, blended traditional techniques with contemporary elements. Using formline to tell stories from her family and culture, Gatensby's works reflect the continuity of cultural practices. The exhibition included gun stocks, largescale paintings, and intricate carvings, offering a rich tapestry of artistic expression that honours the past while engaging with the present.

Our hope is these exhibits collectively underscore the rich cultural tapestry and artistic innovation present in the Yukon, offering profound insights and emotional connections through their diverse themes and narratives.

The works explore themes of grief, loss, and remembrance through thoughtful and poignant use of materials.

Violet Gatensby: Where the Waters Narrow

As an Inland Tlingit artist, Violet Gatensby's work blends traditional techniques with contemporary elements, using formline to tell stories from her family and culture along with ones that reflect the land. Reflecting on the continuity of cultural practices, her solo exhibition included gun stocks, large-scale paintings, and intricate carvings.




Kids Kreate








Revenue Sources for 2023/24






Percentage of Total Revenues:




